



WHEN CAMPERS **BECOME STAFF**

Former Campers Vanessa and Nitya were just two of 32 former campers on summer staff last summer who shared some Camp magic with our incredible campers.

Vanessa first came to Hole in the Wall when she was just six years old for a Family Weekend. She was already no stranger to hospitals, having been first diagnosed with Rhabdomyosarcoma at the age of two, and then relapsing at the age of four. After years of treatment and surgeries, it was a relief to have a place she could escape to and be her truest self.

Over the next several years, Vanessa became a fixture at Camp, returning year after year for the summer program, Family Weekends and even CampOut events. At Camp, Vanessa found kindred spirits and a "hole" lot of fun.

"Camp brought me a community where I could be truly unjudged and not worry about what people thought of how I looked from my treatment," Vanessa said. "At Camp, no one questions you or what you've gone through. I could just be myself and enjoy the programs. Camp has also gotten me a lot of confidence."

After years as a camper, this past summer, Vanessa joined with 31 other former campers to experience a new side of Camp as a summer counselor. Each year, Camp is blessed to see a significant number of our campers return to share their experiences and skills in this important way. When they arrive, they bring an understanding of shared challenges and help campers see that they too can accomplish their dreams.

"The benefits of former campers coming back and joining our summer staff team are endless," said Connecticut Camp Director Alan "Pendo" Pender. "Not only are they an incredible resource to the campers because they have been in their shoes, but I also notice how they go the extra mile to ensure the campers have the most amazing week ever.

I am so grateful for that. But the most impactful part of former campers becoming counselors is that they provide the current campers with motivation, inspiration and HOPE that they too one day can be a Camp counselor."

For Vanessa, being on summer staff was something she always planned to do. She was determined to bring Hole in the Wall magic to other children facing serious illnesses, knowing first-hand how those Camp experiences stay with campers and can positively impact them.

Now, with her first summer on staff behind her, Vanessa has also found that she's not only sharing "a different kind of healing" with her campers; she's also still experiencing it herself. She has continued to build confidence and become more comfortable with herself through her time leading the music program.

"I enjoy getting to see the reactions in other people when they get to experience things at Camp," Vanessa said. "I think seeing myself in the kids and the things that they do helps me heal my inner child in a way too. Just being able to see them have these happy experiences even though they are dealing with things that are very tough. And being able to relate to the kids and have them know you understand them makes a very big difference. I like being a part of that experience for them."

THOUSANDS OF PIECES OF LOVE

When the building that housed arts & crafts, woodshop and the cooking zone was destroyed in a fire in February 2021, our hearts were broken into thousands of pieces. The iconic structure held more than 30 years of memories and special moments and was central to so many camper experiences.

Now, after an outpouring of love and support from our community that included significant gifts from Travelers, the Travelers Championship and Newman's Own Foundation, Camp celebrated the rebuilding of this space with the opening of the new Creative Complex! It is exciting to see what has arisen from the ashes – a space where memories will be made and friendships forged while creativity shines. The Creative Complex includes not only beautifully appointed rooms for arts & crafts, woodshop and the cooking zone, but also some brand new spaces – the Serenity Room where parents and caregivers can gather around the fireplace the future." and The Quiet Corner sensory space with cozy chairs and bookcases flanking the walls. And with sustainability always in mind, the building will also use geothermal for heating and cooling, which will prevent 77 tons of CO2 from entering the atmosphere.

But perhaps the most significant part of the building is the centerpiece located in the creative space – a Camp-inspired mosaic comprised of more than 4,000 pieces representing the more than 4,000 donors

whose gifts allowed for the construction of the new space. Created by professional mosaic artist and former summer staff and Hospital Outreach specialist, Mia Schon, the art captures the spirit of Camp with symbols like stars, pine trees, sunflowers and more, pulled from the lore and history of Camp. It even has some hidden elements tucked away for campers to find within the piece and help get them excited

"This is the most important piece I've ever done, and I'm really honored to be creating this piece for Camp," Mia said. "I was in Israel when I heard about the fire, and I was heartbroken. But mosaics are very symbolic, depicting how though things you love may break, you can put them back together to make something different, new and beautiful. I feel that symbolism fits really well with what happened here and what is to come in

Mia got her start working in mosaics as a Hospital Outreach specialist in Boston, where she not only learned the modality, but shared her passion with her colleagues. She later moved to Israel, where she soon began receiving commissions for her work, primarily partnering with non-profits to create murals. Now, returning to Camp to create this piece brings her artistic work full circle.

Over the three months of the mosaic installation, Mia has also had some Camp friends stop by to provide some help and bring back memories of her time at Hole in the Wall. Donors, volunteers, staff and others have had the opportunity to carefully select and place their own piece within the mural, making the work all the more special. The piece is truly representative of Camp and all the people who make the community

PARDNER PROFILE

Every summer at Hole in the Wall, you'll spot a familiar group of nurses volunteering in the infirmary and hear their laughter echoing throughout Camp. Sue, Noel, Diane and Maryanne, fondly called the Golden Girls around these parts, have been a fixture in the OK Corral since 2011, bringing years of healthcare expertise and plenty of silliness.

The four, who all have spent decades dedicated to nursing careers, met at Camp. First Sue and Noel, who began volunteering as nurses in 2004. Then in 2007, Diane had her first Camp experience. And in 2011, Maryanne joined in the fun. Their stories and backgrounds are unique, coming from Connecticut, New Jersey, New York and even Kansas, but all of them say they leave Hole in the Wall better than when they arrived.

"Camp makes me a better nurse," Sue said. "It feeds the soul."

Watching the campers grow from year to year is a source of happiness for the group – especially when they find one of their own patients joining them onsite for the week or when one of their former campers comes back as a summer counselor. And seeing what all the campers take from their experiences is inspirational.

"It's really heartening to see the kids grow and develop," Noel said. And Diane added, "Kids with hemophilia learn how to self-inject the factor they need. They buddy up. If one kid is afraid, another will come and help. They all fit in here – no one looks at each other differently."



And while the group keeps in touch over the winter and even plans an annual trip to Florida, they can't wait to get back to Camp each summer to share in the magic

"You're doing good work in a beautiful setting with people who care about you and who you care about," Maryanne said. "It makes me refreshed and able to face whatever comes my way."

HOP ON THE GO - GET YOUR GAME ON!

Hole in the Wall's Hospital Outreach program kicked off the year with something new in Boston. Inspired by the broad reach of virtual programming, the team has recently begun a gaming program at UMass Children's Hospital!

Spearheaded by virtual programming lead Hospital Outreach specialist, Brian Lynch, the new program uses Nintendo Switches to connect with children in a different way, offering fun and friendship even when they may not be able to have physical visitors to their room.

"It's been a big dream to give hospitalized children the opportunity to connect with their peers through video gaming," Brian said. "Imagine a bunch of teens sitting together in a friend's basement playing video games. That's the experience we are hoping to recreate here."

While for now, children are primarily interacting with just Brian during the pilot, as the program expands, participants will be able to connect with others in their hospital, and potentially even other hospitals in the region. The program provides a sense of normalcy and fun in situations that are often anything but.

SADDLE UP FOR CAMP

This past holiday season, theater goers in New York City were treated to something unique – "A Sherlock Carol" – a combining of two classic tales into an exciting theatrical experience. Conceived by longtime Camp friend, actor, playwright and director, Mark Shanahan, the show pulls from Mark's love of both mysteries and Dicken's stories, and also found some special inspiration from the children and families of The Hole in the Wall Gang Camp.

The show, which starred Drew McVety as Sherlock, opened in 2021 to rave reviews. It depicts a grown-up Tiny Tim, who enlists Sherlock Holmes' help on Christmas Eve to investigate the mysterious death of his benefactor - one Ebenezer Scrooge. Tim, who overcame childhood illness and grew up to run a hospital treating children who faced similar challenges as he had, was drawn not only from the classic tale, but also from the campers Mark met while writing and directing Hole in the Wall's annual Fandango Benefit Gala over the years.

"I remember the first time I went to Camp I was blown away by the people and their stories," Mark said. "This play and the character of Tiny Tim were really influenced by my work at Camp and the campers I've met."

Mark first began to toy with the idea of a show that brought together the characters of Sherlock Holmes and "A Christmas Carol" in 2019, bringing Drew in on his idea. After seeing the script and participating in a read-through, Drew jumped on board and brought in his producing partner as well. Unfortunately, dreams of a full production were put on hold when COVID-19 struck in 2020, but the team was rearing to go in 2021.

As the production took shape, both Mark and Drew saw an opportunity to build a charity component into their performances. Given the context of the show and its ties to Hole in the Wall, supporting Camp in some capacity seemed a natural fit.

So, in 2022, following in the footsteps of many storied productions over the years, the show closed with a curtain call encouraging patrons to give back and carry the spirit of the season - and the show - forward. Each night following the performance, Drew would step on stage to share about Camp and ask patrons

"The first few times I did it, I was almost overly emotional, as the message of the show lined up so well with the mission of Camp," Drew said. "It was truly an honor to be able to do this and help in any way that

Looking ahead, Mark and Drew are hoping for the show's return to New York City, and its continued expansion across the U.S. and internationally. Their dream is that other productions will be able carry the message of being charitable forward as well and also support charities near and dear to their cast and crew.

"We are so grateful to Mark and Drew for not only raising funds for Camp through this exciting opportunity, but also raising awareness for Hole in the Wall each night of the performance," said Andrea Keefe, director of corporate and community partnerships at Hole in the Wall. "It's wonderful to see a partnership come together that is such a natural fit, and we look forward to working with them both for years to come."

SHERIFF'S SPOTLIGHT

When Aaron Corona, senior director of Regulatory Operations in Global Regulatory Affairs at Amicus Therapeutics, first heard about Hole in the Wall during a Lunch & Learn at work, his first thought was "How can we do more as an organization?" Amicus was already a supporter of Camp, providing four camperships annually, but Aaron thought the company's impact could be bigger. So, he reached out to Camp to see what else they could do.

"We started off by supporting some of the programs with Hospi tal Outreach at Morgan Stanley Children's Hospital in New York and Children's Hospital of Philadelphia - Slime Day, Carnivarty, and more," Aaron said. "It was fun for the employees to all be together, and even though it wasn't designed to be a team building activity, it ended up being a great bonding opportunity!"

Over the years, Amicus expanded its support, bringing volunteers to events every summer and even offering its Central New Jersey office space for a CampOut event. But when the pandemic shut everything down in 2020, in-person volunteering came to a halt as well. Amicus was not deterred in their efforts to support Hole in the Wall though. The company has a partnership with Building Impact, a nonprofit that plans impactful volunteering and giving experiences by connecting companies with charitable organizations. Led by Anthony DeVergillo, Amicus' Head of Digital Employee Communications, Building Impact was approached

"I myself was a camper at different camps (for children with serious illnesses)," Anthony said. "Any camp you go to is a safe space. It allowed me to open up and talk about my disease."

Amicus' generous support goes beyond camperships and volunteering. Their partnership with Hole in the Wall over the past few years has been a part of Amicus' Healing Beyond Disease© corporate initiative for philanthropy and volunteerism. Under this initiative, the company also encourages employees to contribute to causes they find meaningful and then supports those gifts with corporate matches.
